# WINTER DRIVING CHECKLIST

#### Prepare your vehicle

Service Antifreeze tested All lights clean and working. Battery check Windscreen and windows clean Washer topped up and with the correct mix to ensure the contents don't freeze up.

#### Carry rescue equipment

tow rope spare bulbs spare fuel shovel hazard warning triangle or similar spare wheel (with tyre at correct pressure and tread) high visibility jacket jump leads emergency tyre weld (for temporary 'low speed' repair)

wellington boots or similar de-icing equipment first aid equipment (in good order) working torch car blanket fire extinguisher (fully operative)

# Plan your journey by checking:

Weather forecast Heed any adverse travel warnings Understand the hazards Consider the safest route

Whilst on the subject of winter driving, I was pleased to receive the following report by one of our associates, Marianne Cassidy.

## Skid Pan Training – Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> September 2009

It was a grey September morning in Maidstone but at the Kent Police Training School six drivers (a mixture of RoSPA members, associates and guest) were battling the inclement conditions of ice and snow on the skidpan. What a rewarding experience it was too. A must for any driver who like me has never experienced a full blown rear wheel skid. I immediately realised that just a touch too much speed on the turn sent the car pirouetting round like a spinning top. Luckily by the end of the session with Paul Berry's helpful tuition we had all learned to drive in a figure of eight with reasonable control using a combination of careful steering and gentle control of the gas, which was very rewarding.

Fun though it was, it is a sobering thought to imagine that happening out on the road. I was surprised at how quickly the control is lost and if the speed is too fast it cannot be regained. My 20-year-old daughter came along with me and I know she benefited greatly. Three years ago (just after passing her test) she had a nasty skid experience on Maidstone Bridge. After her skid pan training she recognised the reason it had happened was because she had driven too fast for the freezing black ice conditions on the bridge. I know resources are not available but I can't help thinking that this sort of training would be so invaluable for all young drivers, simply because they get the chance to experience what can happen.

I was apprehensive about doing the skidpan training, but I thoroughly enjoyed it and now feel that I am much better prepared should I find myself in a skid situation. I will certainly do the intermediate and advanced sessions. I would like to thank RoSPA for giving me the opportunity to do it and would recommend it to anybody who has not yet given it a go.

"Elderly drivers should have to retake the driving test" Says Sir Stirling Moss. He believes they should be re-examined after their 70<sup>th</sup>, 75<sup>th</sup> and 80<sup>th</sup> Birthdays.

There are more than 3 million drivers over the age of 70 on british roads and the total is expected to reach 4.5 million in the next 5 years.
